Dear Parents and Carers,

Supporting Students to develop into resilient, responsible citizens of the world

Our school follows the guidelines of **Whole School Positive Behaviour Support**, a framework that brings school communities together to develop positive, safe, supportive learning cultures. Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) is an approach promoted by the Department of Education as it assists schools to improve social, emotional, behavioural and academic outcomes for students.

When PBS is implemented well, teachers and students have more time to focus on relationships and classroom instruction. Students and staff benefit from:

- increased respectful and positive behaviour
- increased time focused on instruction
- improved social-emotional wellbeing
- positive and respectful relationships among students and staff
- increased adoption of evidence-based instructional practices
- a predictable learning environment with improved perceptions of safety and increased attendance

The PBS framework supports schools to identify and successfully implement evidence-based whole-school practices to enhance learning outcomes for young people. The PBS Framework

Key Features of PBS

Implementation of PBS requires commitment by the whole school community.

All PBS schools implement eight essential features. They will:

Establish a common philosophy and purpose: Staff and students use a common language to discuss behaviour. School philosophy emphasises the need to teach appropriate behaviour much like academic learning. This includes ensuring knowledge around neurodiversity as all teachers are adept at making appropriate individual adjustments to ensure inclusion and equity.

Establish Leadership and school-wide support: A team at the school leads implementation by creating, reviewing and monitoring an action plan. The work is done in collaboration by the whole staff with input from parents, students and the community.

Clearly define a set of expected behaviours: The school identifies 3-5 behavioural expectations that apply at all times. Such an expectation is 'we keep out hands and feet to ourselves'. All classes use the language of 'whole body listening'.

Clear, positively stated examples are identified and displayed in different school settings. You may have seen posters about 'using our toilet facilities respectfully'. Currently at our school you can hear us praising students for 'walking quietly and safely around the school'. Our next expectation is focusing on the Expectations of Eating Areas – you will hear us saying 'Check Litter, Lunchbox, Look (for anything left behind like your water bottle or sports equipment), Leave' when the two minute warning chimes sound before the end of recess and end of lunch sirens.

Establish procedures for teaching and practising expected behaviours: A school-wide plan is developed to ensure behavioural expectations are <u>taught</u> to all students by all staff.

Implement a continuum of procedures to encourage expected behaviours: School-wide systems are developed to acknowledge expected behaviour and promote commitment from all members of the school community.

Develop a continuum of procedures to discourage inappropriate behaviour: Schools clearly define problem behaviours and identify specific strategies and responses to minor and major behavioural infractions. Parents can see *Behaviour Responses* charts in each classroom, as well as the *Classroom Engagement* flow chart, that clearly outlines responses and steps to maintaining a positive classroom.

Use procedures for record-keeping, decision making and ongoing monitoring: Schools review data on repeated behaviour issues, the settings in which they occur, and the consequences most likely to be applied for inappropriate behaviours. They correlate these with other sources of data such as academic

progress and analyse this data to make necessary adjustments to school operations to reduce inappropriate behaviour.

Support and Specialist staff to use effective classroom practices: Schools establish systems to support staff to adopt evidence-based instructional practices associated with reductions in inappropriate behaviour.


PBS uses a tiered intervention framework which invests in:

- primary prevention (tier 1): supports for all students, staff and settings
- secondary prevention (tier 2): additional specialised group systems for students with at-risk behaviour
- tertiary prevention (tier 3): specialised, individualised systems for students with high-risk behaviour, provided in addition to primary and secondary prevention

Taking a proactive approach by explicitly teaching behaviour expectations supports our **Student Engagement Plan**.




Three-tiered levels of support

Other dates will be advised and added to the eNews Calendar as volunteers can be coordinated.




