Dear Parents and Carers,



<u>Developing Automaticity with Handwriting so that our brains have clear space for</u> <u>Creativity</u>

Our school has a whole school approach to Handwriting. Our school uses the South Australian Font, as this font uses common hand strokes from formative pre-writing, through to printing then cursive writing.




We know handwriting is a critical part of literacy that is required for good writing and good reading skills. As students hear letters, see letters and say letters they should also be forming letters, because this helps form the neurological pathways in the brain.

It is likely that at least a quarter of any class will have difficulty with handwriting. This has implications for the cognitive load on students who are asked to complete tasks that use pencil and paper.

We learn about and pay attention to:

- Core strength we need proximal stability before we can have distal mobility
- **Proprioception** our internal body awareness. Sometimes students need brain breaks, might want a wobble cushion, might wiggle. Students are giving their body feedback that they are 'here'. Teachers are aware that some disabilities impact deeply on proprioception and act on recommendations.
- Occulomotor skills the ability to use our eyes in a smooth manner help us follow the words in a line as you are reading and follow a line on a page for writing. Our practise includes following a target in and out or tracking following a moving target with eyes only, not moving your head. Its tricky!
- **Motor Planning** is the ability to see an action then copy it. It includes gross motor, fine motor and writing. Motor planning has a big influence on letter planning. Teachers understand that students who experience motor planning difficulty are finding handwriting really challenging we give
- students support, breaks, and work with them to make their load as heavy or as light as they can manage at that time. Students need very explicit instruction, scaffolding, visual demonstrations, verbal support and enough repetition as is required. Lots of daily physical activity help students with motor planning – we love that Daily Fitness is a critical part of handwriting development!
- Fine motor skills are the ability to use our hands and fingers together in a coordinated manner. We think about the pincer grip, using both hands together, crossing the body midline, shoulder stability and strength.



We need to master the basics first – can a student hold a writing implement; can they make the strokes that are required to form letters. Students master letter formation and have automaticity in that before they can move on to speed and legibility factors.

Our school gives explicit instruction in handwriting. We teach how to form letters; we practise correctly forming letters before we use those letters within words. We use lots of repetition. We work on students self-composing letters as they match the sound, the name and the shape to the letters.

We pay attention to Pencil Skills:

- Grips functional grips are the aim. People hold the pencil slightly differently, we have some difference in our grips that are functional, however teachers train for a tripod or quadruped grip. We try help students strengthen and control their small muscles yet sometimes pencil aids help for students who live with hypermobility for example or if the student's pencil grip would benefit from extra support. Left handers are supported to develop their personal grip that is functional.
- The wrist is on the table, not floating in the air and
- We look for the fingers doing the writing, rather than the whole forearm.

**Kindy and Pre-Primary** see lots of activities that help strengthen fine motors skills as well as core body strength, balance, eye-hand coordination, and gross motor skills. We tell stories about letter starting points as we self-compose letters in the air, in sand, rice, on the grass, using paint.... As well as on paper with a variety of writing tools. Across our school we have a common language for letter formation – look in classrooms for the illustrations of the language that gives the hint for the motor action for the letter formation being currently practised.

**Year One and Two** sees teachers practicing finger strength, core stability and stretching prior to deliberate handwriting instruction, along with hearing, naming, seeing and then self-composing letters.

**Year Three and Four** continues with developing finger strength and stability, core body strength and posture and we add the language of linking letters – pre-cursive handwriting – as we see, name, sound and self-compose letters and place them into words. Students start to actively set their own handwriting goals, they begin to develop their own strategies to achieve their goals and they begin to actively evaluate achievement.

In **Year Five and Six** students may have developed their own most efficient handwriting style. Explicit teaching of handwriting focuses automaticity of correct letter shape for efficiency and speed, and size considerations to enable legibility. Our senior students can identify their achievements and set personal goals to improve eg join certain letters more smoothly for example.

You can see we are taking handwriting seriously at our school. A whole school approach to handwriting means your child/ren can expect to build on the skills taught the previous year, and that handwriting expectations in classrooms are similar. We are wanting the art of handwriting to be embedded for our students, so they do not have to concentrate so hard on letter formation and legibility as they are generating ideas and creating projects.

The educators at Tuart Hill are exceptional at making necessary adjustments for students with special needs and those who may demonstrate difficulties, and you are invited to meet with your class teacher if you want to explore any such adjustments further.


