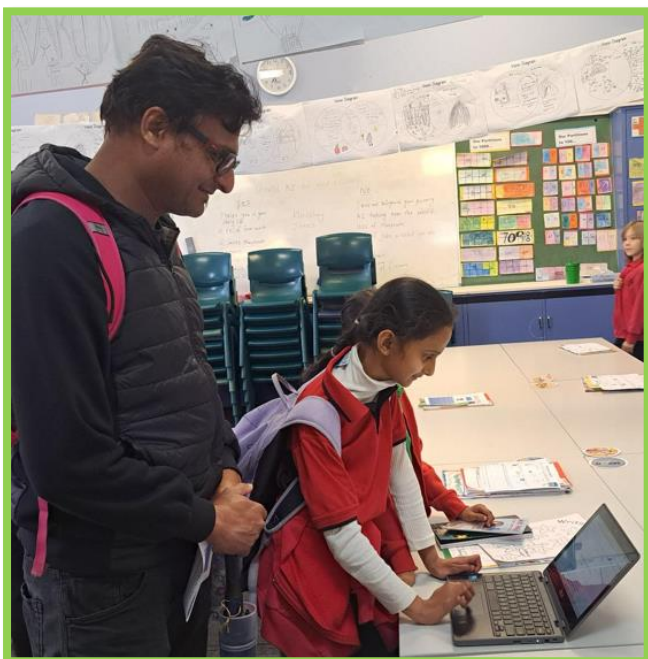
People send their children to school to get a better education and knowledge on weekdays. All schools are similar in some way. In my opinion, children should not be paid to attend school.

School Development Day Friday 16 August 2024

Thank you for your support, allowing a Pupil Free Day so that our teachers and support Educators could immerse ourselves in important whole school Professional Development.

Mr Ben McGuire shared best practice around **Cultural Responsiveness in the Workplace**, outlining student experiences from an Aboriginal and English as an Additional Language or Dialect viewpoint. Ben's insight from his lived experience rang true with us, as we continue to work toward authentic inclusion and equitable curriculum access for all our students.

Our Berry Street Educational Model Team led us through a reflection on what has been working well, and what we will implement next in our work to ensure our classrooms are safe inclusive places of learning for all students.

School Based Data Expert Shelley

Harfoushian guided staff through systems data analysis, focusing on what the data means to our classroom teaching, with support from Keaton Brown and Phase of Learning Team leaders. We examined our Progressive Achievement Test (PAT) Data at each year level in depth, identifying successes and discussing action in regard to the challenges.

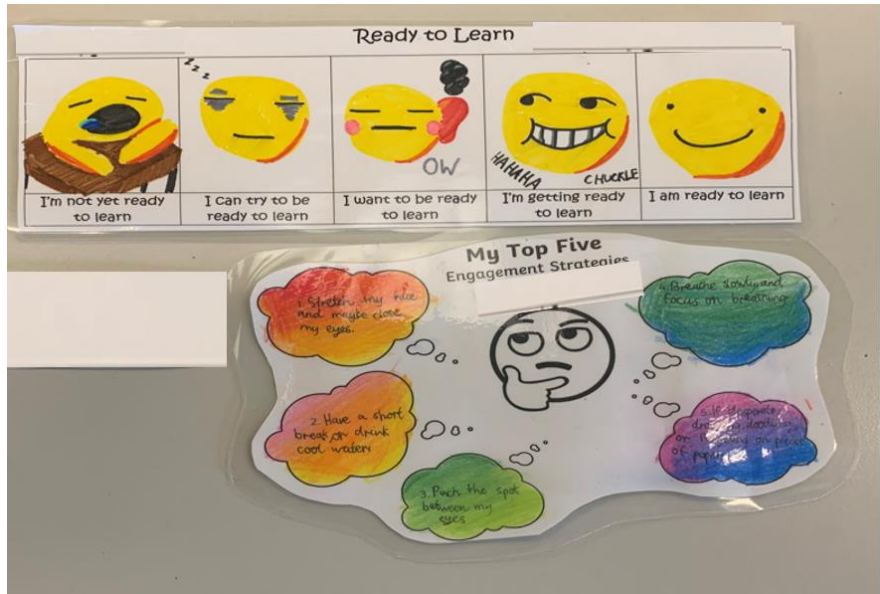

OFFICIAL Rules



Any depth
If players can touch the bottom, they may not walk while touching the ball or jump off the bottom in attack or defence



Players in the water
6 INC. 1 GOAL KEEPER

7-10 PER TEAM
mixed

All players to get equal playing time across all positions in a game

4 minute quarters
1 minute break
2 minute half time

Aim of the game
While protecting the ball from the other team, try to score the most amount of goals



Attempt to shoot or steal the ball from the other team.

- Only use one hand to touch the ball
- Avoid deliberately touching another player
- Avoid pushing the ball fully under water



A referee will issue a 'free throw' if any of these rules are broken.

A free throw means that the all other players must move at least 1m away from the person with the ball until they pass it (you cannot shoot a goal off a free throw)



To Start the game / each quarter:
One player from each team swims from their goal line to the middle to reach the ball first then pass to their team



Pass the ball three times before a shot a goal

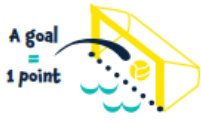
Don't hold onto the ball for too long



If the ball goes OUT of the pool
The team who did not touch the ball last gets the ball back in line with where the ball first went out



To score a goal
A goal is scored by the whole ball crossing the goal line



After a goal is scored
After a goal is scored, all players must rotate, including as goal keeper



To re-start after a goal
The team that did not score the goal re-starts with the ball lined up at half-way



If the **SCORE GAP** reaches 10 goals or greater, the trailing team may add one additional field player until the score gap becomes less than 10 goals.
